SUNDAY 3 MARCH 2024 – THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

Readings - Exodus 20.1-17; Psalm 19; 1 Corinthians 1.18-25; John 2.13-22

<u>Sentence</u> – God spoke these words and said, I am the Lod your God, who brough you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.' (Exodus 20.1)

<u>Prayer of the day</u> – Lord of God, by your Holy Spirit write your commandments upon our hearts and grant us the wisdom and power of the cross, so that, cleansed from greed and selfishness, we may become a living temple of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Scripture Reflection -

The cleansing of the temple occurs directly after the first of seven "signs" in John's Gospel, all of which are explicitly Christological. The Wedding of Cana is a sign through which we see his glory, glory that reveals Jesus' identity as the Son of the Father.¹

God calls prophets to be speakers for God, so they boldly proclaim, "This is the word of the Lord." Israel's prophets spoke God's word of judgement, grace, and hope, telling the truth about God and God's Way and Israel and Israel's ways. ²

John places the temple cleansing at the very outset of Jesus' public ministry because prophetic speech is not always understood when it is first voiced. From the outset, Jesus does more than speak God's word; he is God's Word. What he says is more than truth, for he is Truth. Through his word and actions, Jesus reveals the truth about who God is, who we are, what God has to do with us and what we have to do with one another.³

The story of the cleansing of the temple as John tells it points toward the replacement of the temple with the temple of Jesus' body, a narrative foreshadowing of Christ's death and resurrection and its embodiment in the celebration of the Eucharist. ⁴

During Lent, we are reminded that the story of Jesus culminates at the cross but does not end there. Taking only parts of the story will lead us to an incomplete and inadequate understanding of Jesus. And it might leave us in a temple of our own construction that is dedicated to the purposes of God but, in reality, stands in opposition to them.⁵

Questions for Scripture Reflection

- (1) Why did this make Jesus angry?
- (2) Can you think of any comparisons in today's world?
- (3) What does this tell us about God's feelings for the holiness of the temple/church?

SUNDAY 10 MARCH 2024 – FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Readings – Numbers 21.4-9; Psalm 107.1-3, 17-22; Ephesians 2.1-10; John 3.14-21.

<u>Sentence</u> – The Son of Man must be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. (John 3.14-15)

<u>Prayer of the day</u> – Everlasting God in whom we live and move and have our being, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they find their rest in you: give us purity of heart and strength of purpose, that no selfish passion may hinder us from knowing your will, no weakness prevent us from doing it; that in your light we may see light, and in your service find perfect freedom; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Scripture Reflection -

How we react to Jesus is a measure of where we stand and to what extent our souls are laid bare. Jesus' love, even with nostalgic yearning, allows a glimpse of hope for us. However, if we see nothing in Christ, we have condemned ourselves. The one who was sent in love has become our judge. ¹

This passage from John attempts to provide an answer and addresses the tension between God's desire for the world's salvation and the world's often negative response. John's Gospel presents Jesus as the true light that shines with divine brilliance into the world's darkness (1:4-9; 3:19-21; 8:12; 12:46). Some people are drawn to this light; others, however, retreat from it. Why is this? ²

The text leads us toward noticing and seeing God's involvement in establishing the moral love of those who ultimately come to Christ.³

John's Gospel plays the themes of belief, judgement, and eternal life. This passage contributes its own powerful message of God's extraordinary love for the world and a connection between believing and moral actions and God.⁴

- 1. Does God love us because Jesus died for our sins, or did Jesus die for our sins because God loves us? Use John 3:16-17 to help answer that question.
- 2. What does it mean to be condemned? Why is it important that God's motivation for sending his son was based on saving rather than condemning?

SUNDAY 17 MARCH 2024 - FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Readings – Jeremiah 31.31-34; Psalm 119,9-16; Hebrews 5.5-14; John 12.20-33

<u>Sentence</u> – 'This is the covenant I will make with them,' says the Lord God: 'I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God and they shall be my people.'

Jeremiah 31.33

<u>Prayer of the day</u> – O God, our Redeemer, in our weakness we have failed to be your messengers of forgiveness and hope: renew us by your Holy Spirit, that we may follow your commands and proclaim your reign of love; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

Scripture Reflection

"The hour has come," says Jesus. It is an hour to which his whole life has been leading, an hour in which he will be glorified. The "hour" of which Jesus speaks sounds like a cautionary and foreboding tale of diminishment, destruction, and loss – even though it may have a happy ending. Indeed, as the hour comes, Jesus says that his very soul is troubled. Yet he will not ask to be spared this hour, for it bears the reason of his life. ¹

The "hour" of utter self-abandonment and acceptance even of abandonment by God – the hour of love that holds "no matter what" – is consummation. ²

By the cross, life and love are offered to Jesus' disciples, and the cross, in this sense, constitutes both an appeal and a demand; it attracts and heals. Believing this, the followers of Jesus can come in trust to the "hour" in which they must share. ³

The Fourth Gospel makes it clear that the incarnation of God is the first movement in God's action of self-emptying, which will be consummated in a final free, surrendering love. Therefore, the "hour" in the end is not unexpected. The God who became human will affect an action of ultimate love by dying on the cross of human existence. 4

SUNDAY 24 MARCH 2024 – PALM SUNDAY

Readings – Isaiah 50.4-9a; Psalm 31.9-18; Philippians 2.5-11; Mark 14.1-15.27

<u>Sentence</u> – At the name of Jesus, every knee shall bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Philippians 2.10-11

<u>Prayer of the day</u> – Everlasting God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son to take our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross: in your mercy enable us to share in his obedience to your will and in the glorious victory of his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**.

Scripture Reflection -

Jesus' passion teaches us what love looks like.

Interpretations of the meaning of the death of Jesus are important not only because our understanding of this event is essential to our spiritual lives but also because interpretations of the passion and death of Jesus have had some troubling consequences in our world. ¹

The last words of Jesus are reported differently in the four Gospels. Mark and Matthew, writes that Jesus cries out from the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Luke reports Jesus' last words as "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit," and in John's Gospel, the final words Jesus says are simply, "It is finished." All these accounts need to be held together in our efforts to make the logical sense of the passion and death of Jesus.²

At the heart of the Christian symbol of the cross has been a kind of paradigm of human suffering – where bodies are destroyed, minds ravaged, and spirits broken, in the agonies of human history when peoples subjugate peoples, families are rent asunder by abuse and starvation, and everywhere there is relentless dying. ³

The point of the cross is not finally suffering and death; rather, it is that a relationship holds. There is love stronger than death, that can withstand whatever the forces of evil do against it, and that can hold suffering even as it struggles to alleviate it. ⁴

The meaning of the cross can be understood finally only within the whole of the good news of the promise of God to overcome terror, enfold us in Life, and dwell with us forever. ⁵

SUNDAY 31 MARCH 2024 – EASTER DAY

<u>Readings</u> – Acts 10.34-43; Psalm 118.1-2, 14-24; 1 Corinthians 15.1-11; John 20.1-18

<u>Sentence</u> – The Lord is risen indeed, alleluia!

<u>Prayer of the day</u> – Brightness of God's glory, whom death could not conquer nor the tomb imprison: as you have shared our frailty in human flesh, help us to share your immortality in the Spirit; let no shadow of the grave terrify us, and no fear of darkness turn our hearts from you. Reveal yourself to us this day and all our days, as the First and the Last, the Living One, our immortal Saviour and Lord. **Amen**.

Scripture Reflection -

John's account of the first Easter morning provides a charter for the Easter Community that has arisen around the memories to which John bears witness. His story of the visit to the unexpectedly empty tomb furnishes two dramatic images of what kind of community comes to birth and thrives in the wake of Easter. ¹

These images remind the church that the beloved community can quickly look for work of divine love amid the tragedies of personal existence and the injustices of social experience, even when most of the world believes that dream has long since ended.²

In seeing empty tomb and empty grave clothes in these enduring signs of its life, the beloved community is free to believe, along with that of the beloved disciple, that the power of God's love continues to permeate the world, undeterred by waves of death or destruction.³

We as an easter community are called to be more extensive, creative, and enduring in calling names of all those wounded and afflicted by greed, insensitivity, and injustice, just because we hear the Good Shepard calling those names as well.

- 1. What piece of evidence do you find most compelling for the resurrection? How would you respond to a friend who said, 'surely we can't believe that Jesus really rose from the dead?'
- 2. Look at Jesus's words to Mary in vs17. What do we learn about the significance of Jesus' resurrection? How does this provide assurance for us at a time like this?
